Rosemont HS Continues to LEAD

We are excited about the opening of this school year for a number of reasons. To begin, our academic programs, designed to prepare our students for a post-secondary education with high-interest material and curriculum that is aligned with the Common Core State Standards, are really taking shape.

The Leadership and Enrichment through Academic Development (LEAD) program is in its second year and has welcomed another strong class of freshmen to be the front runners of academics and community service at Rosemont High School. LEAD is a criteria-based program that offers our strongest students in English a university-level curriculum that will prepare them for any 4-year college of their choice.

The Energy Science Engineering Academy (ESEA) and the Sports Careers and Wellness Academy (SCWA) are in their first year and have already drawn a number of students to their respective pathways. ESEA is designed to give students interested in pursuing the Engineering field at the university level a foundation for the math and science courses they will need to take to be successful. The SCWA focuses on nutrition, body mechanics, and physiology with the goal of teaching young people how physical fitness and mental preparedness go hand in hand.

Both the Green Academy, which emphasizes environmental awareness and personal responsibility for the planet, and the Arts Media Pathway, a collection of technical classes that teach skills related to the digital media field, are going strong.

Transitional Kinder Program at Maximum



The voluntary California Early-Kinder program is in its fourth year statewide. The College-Glen Community asked and received approval for participation during the trial stage of the program. This traditional kindergarten program is academically oriented and has a pre-kindergarten English language arts and mathematics curriculum designed to build a strong foundation to help students enter the District’s regular kindergarten program. The Bancroft program is currently housed at the Thomas Jefferson site. The program currently has enrolled the maximum 24 students and there is a long waiting list.

California Montessori Project

The school year is off to a great start! We have 313 students in our K to 8 program who are eager to be back in the swing of things. In a Montessori program, the first 6 to 8 weeks of school is commonly known as a “normalization period.” This is the time the teachers and students get to know each other, set the expectations from all members of the community and establish routines. Students are also assessed during this time to establish baselines in the areas of reading, math and writing from which individualized programs for students will be based. After the “normalization period” parent volunteers are welcome to support the class community. Classes will also be going on different field trips which are an essential component of the Montessori program.

On November 2nd, everyone is invited to attend our Annual Harvest Festival from 11 AM to 3 PM. There will be food, fun, games, arts and crafts, and something for everyone. We will also be having a Scholastic Book Fair on that day, and this is a great time to purchase those holiday presents. On November 14th, we will be having a parent informational event from 5:00-6:30 PM regarding Montessori and Common Core Standards. On December 5th, we will be having our Annual Continent Party from 5:00-6:30 PM, where we celebrate culture and diversity. Students’ research work on different countries will be presented. All are invited.

30th Annual Rugby Tournament January 18th & 19th

The Sacramento Valley Rugby Foundation will host the 30th Annual Kick Off Tournament for high school age players this coming January 18th and 19th at the Rancho Cordova High School sports fields. Statewide Civic Education Task Force Seeks Curriculum Changes

I am honored to serve as co-chair of a new statewide task force charged with producing recommendations for dramatically improving civic education in California schools.

The Task Force on K-12 Civic Learning was created by Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson to help elevate the importance of civic learning in California.

We have an aggressive timeline and much ground to cover. We have a year to perform the work and will engage the public in this endeavor. Our goal is to help students become more informed and engaged citizens. We can’t do this without the ideas and energy of adults and youth at our schools and community leaders. So, we will conduct up to six regional meetings throughout the state and provide an opportunity for people to comment electronically. Dates and meeting times are pending.

During the process, we will look at a lot of elements of K-12 curriculum, such as instructional practices, professional development for teachers, and partnerships with the community and businesses, and produce a Civic Learning Blueprint by July 2014.

This is excellent timing as California’s implementation of the Common Core State Standards is prompting us to reassess those practices we have in place to prepare students for college and career. We need to better prepare our students to become responsible, actively engaged citizens in our democratic society. I believe this effort steers us in that direction.

School Named for U-CAN Founder Dr. Rowe

On September 9, the third school opened under the Fortune Countywide Charter – authorized by the Sacramento County Board of Education – was formally named Alan Rowe College Prep. The dedication ceremony continued Fortune’s tradition of naming its schools in honor of living African American community pioneers. Present at the ceremony, Dr. Alan Rowe founded U-CAN, the United College Action Network, in 1988. U-CAN provides leadership, services, and assistance to students wishing to enroll in four-year Historically Black Colleges or Universities (HBCUs). At the ceremony, Charter CEO Margaret Fortune noted that U-CAN’s efforts have resulted in 15,000 students being accepted into HBCUs, many receiving scholarships that have totaled more than \$35,000,000.

U-CAN’s services include counseling and workshops for students and their families, help with course selection, consultation regarding admission and scholarship eligibility, and even campus visits. U-CAN has developed successful partnerships, support, outreach, and mentoring programs throughout California.

Dr. Rowe’s extensive background in public and community service has been a key factor in U-CAN’s success. A career state employee, Dr. Rowe was a member of Black Advocates in State Service for over a quarter century. He was an elected trustee in the former Grant Joint Union High School District for 13 years, as well as a member of the Coalition of California Black School Board Members and the National Caucus of Black School Board Members.

Alan Rowe College Prep is located at 9424 Big Horn Boulevard in Elk Grove. Serving grades K-3 this year, the school will add one grade per year.

The New Common Core Standards

Many people have heard about the new Common Core Standards but have questions about what they are and why we are adopting them. So here is a quick overview.

For many years California schools have been using our own state-developed standards for grade levels and subject areas. After much discussion, educational leaders decided to join together with 45 other states to adopt standards that are internationally recognized, rigorous, and focused on critical thinking and other skills needed to be successful in the 21st century. These are not “federal” standards imposed from Washington DC; they have been adopted state-by state and have broad support across the US.

While similar to our existing standards, the common core emphasizes deeper thinking and more rigor. For example, students will be reading more informational text and learning to develop an argument and select supporting evidence. In math, especially at the early grades, emphasis will be on deeper understanding of concepts to give the students confidence in mathematical skills. Students will demonstrate their knowledge by solving real-world problems mathematically. And the new Smarter Balanced Assessments will be computer-based and require students to explain their answers, not just fill in an A, B, C, or D bubble.

SCOE will continue to provide professional development for teachers on the new standards so that they can provide the very best instruction for students and prepare them for careers in a competitive world.

Bill to Restrict Sale of Animals at Swap Meets and Flea Markets Signed

On September 6, Assembly Bill 339, a bill I authored, was signed into law by Governor Brown. The bill will prohibit the sale of animals at swap meets and flea markets unless the local jurisdiction adopts minimum animal care and treatment standards in order to prevent the suffering of animals, protect consumers, and eliminate the public health and safety risks and potential threats of disease outbreaks associated with such sales.

Puppies, kittens, baby rabbits, turtles, exotic birds, reptiles, and poultry are commonly sold at flea markets and swap meets in often abysmal conditions where there is no legal oversight of the seller and no consumer accountability. They are frequently kept in unsanitary, crowded stacked pens or cages, without food or water, and/or in extreme heat and direct sunlight and handled by shoppers.

Swap meets and flea markets have also historically been prime outlets for the sale of smuggled birds presenting conservation, welfare, and disease outbreak concerns. The bargain-sales atmosphere of flea markets and swap meets encourages impulse-buying and leads to increased costs to local government for sheltering discarded animals.

AB 339 will regulate animal sales permitted at swap meets and flea markets to alleviate the suffering of animals, ensure that public health and safety is protected, and safeguard consumers.

Dedication to Service Honored Forever

A bronze plaque honoring County Animal Control Officer Roy Marcum is on permanent display in the courtyard of Sacramento County's animal shelter. It serves as a memorial reminding all of us about this dedicated public servant killed in the line of duty who was passionate about animals.

Officer Marcum served the people of Sacramento County and was dedicated to the welfare of the animals within it. He had been employed with the Department of Animal Care and Regulation for 14 years before his life was taken during an animal welfare inspection.

Recently Officer Marcum was recognized nationally with the R.D. "Bob" Ward Memorial Posthumous Award from the National Animal Control Association at its conference in Atlanta on September 5. Dr. Ward was a Texas pioneer among those striving for professionalism in the Animal Control field and was an outstanding example of the type of person who gives their all for a just cause.

The public can view the Marcum Memorial Plaque at the animal shelter, located at 3839 Bradshaw Road, one mile south of Highway 50, during normal business hours Wednesday through Friday from 12:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. as well as Saturday and Sunday from 12 noon to 4:30 p.m. At the shelter, visitors can view the many lost and abandoned animals available for adoption – the types of animals Officer Marcum rescued in service to the residents of Sacramento County.

Implementation of the Affordable Care Act

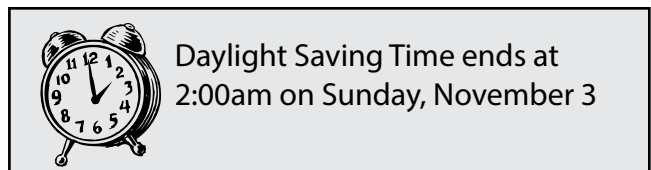

As we look toward full implementation of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) in 2014, millions of Americans will have the ability to finally choose affordable, high-quality health insurance. Over the past three years, as provisions of the law have begun to be implemented, we have seen increased consumer protections and cuts to the overall cost of health care.

We are now approaching another important milestone in the legislation. On October 1st, enrollment began for individuals in the Health Insurance Marketplace, known in California as Covered California, and for small businesses in the Small Business Health Options Program (SHOP). Individuals and small businesses are now able to shop for the health insurance plan that best fits their needs. You can find more information about the available plans by visiting Covered California's website at www.coveredca.com.

Health insurance plans in California have been working with Covered California to negotiate competitive premiums that offer better benefits and new consumer protections. Additionally, Covered California will provide tools to make coverage more affordable. This enrollment period will end for calendar year 2014 on March 30, 2014. Coverage for those who enroll will begin January 1, 2014.

At its core, the ACA is working to ensure quality health care is more affordable and accessible to the American people and on October 1st, individuals and business owners were able to make health care decisions based on what works best for them.



Perspective on Citywide Solid Waste Changes

 Many residents are still grappling with the changes to the City’s yard waste “Claw” services which were mandated by the voters last November via Measure T. We received the most feedback from residents about the switch from weekly to bi-weekly recycling pick-up. I was very conflicted about this vote last year, but ultimately voted yes with a couple of caveats.

The positives are that the City saves over \$1 million annually in operational expenses (weekly vs. biweekly), and the change will allow customer rates to remain constant through July 1, 2015. On the downside, it is more burdensome for residents. While many residents may be okay with paying the extra \$5 a month for a second blue can, they may not have room on their property. I’m also concerned that the city’s overall recycling rate will drop significantly, a concern echoed last year by residents and environmental advocates. This issue is critical to the City since our current waste diversion rate is barely over the state-mandated threshold of 50%.

For these reasons, as part of the 2012 vote, I mandated that City staff closely monitor and analyze recycling rates and re-visit this issue next summer. We should receive our first Solid Waste Department staff analysis in the next couple of months, and I’ll keep residents posted on the results.

Lastly, the City continues to work on additional ways to promote recycling and divert trash from the landfills. In the coming months, the City will be unveiling new programs to further the recycling of Styrofoam and curb unnecessary plastic bag waste. Further, my office is exploring an idea to launch a neighborhood pilot project to recycle food waste, as is currently being done in 175 cities across America.

Customers Will Reap Benefits From “SmartSacramento” Initiative

Until recently, the electric grid operated in much the same fashion for as it did a century earlier.

Now, in the relative blink of eye, change is coming.

The grid is being modernized to take advantage of such emerging technologies as smart meters, energy storage and home energy displays. The \$308 million invested in SMUD’s “Smart Sacramento” initiative is a major step in this transformation.

This past spring, just 3½ years after being receiving a \$127.5 million smart grid infrastructure grant, the largest federal grant awarded to any California utility, SMUD met the Department of Energy’s deadline for installing nearly all of the authorized smart-grid equipment.

SmartSacramento encompassed more than 40 different projects. Expanded capabilities in the new SMUD’s control room allow operators to resolve or minimize many outages without having to dispatch a troubleshooter to the scene. The federal grant funded the implementation of software enhances SMUD’s ability to prevent, detect and respond to cyber security events.

Smart thermostats and in-home displays help customers monitor their energy use. Energy storage technologies will help integrate solar power into the distribution system more effectively.

Ultimately, the smart grid will help reduce the environmental impact of the electrical system by supporting renewable generation, greater system efficiency, increased customer efficiency, and a reduction of peak load during the heaviest summer hours of usage.

While making the Sacramento region’s entire electric grid smart is a work in progress, it’s some of the most important work SMUD has done in its 66 years of service.

Summer Snapshot on Crime

Crime took no vacation this past summer with our neighborhood’s “traditional” leader, burglary from automobiles, taking the notorious honor of being the number one crime in our area. During the summer, the most crimes were committed on Fridays with the least number of crimes committed on Tuesdays. The most home burglaries this summer were committed on August 22. Cooler weather is approaching. Remember that your home is more inviting to a burglar when your ground floor windows are left wide open.

Here is a snapshot of how the area fared this summer on crime from July 1 through September 20.

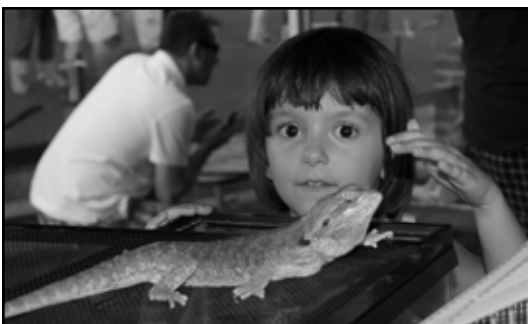
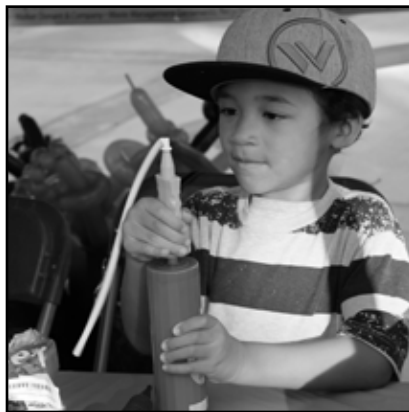
National Family Night Out Fun for All

Halloween Safety

There's something scarier about Halloween than the costumes: It's the deadliest day for child pedestrian accidents. If you're going door-to-door:

- Always accompany young children.
- Exercise great caution during the "deadliest" hours: between 5 and 9 p.m. The study shows that the hour between 6 and 7 p.m. is especially dangerous for pedestrian accidents.
- Stick to neighborhoods with sidewalks. If you must walk on the street, keep to the far left, facing traffic.
- Practice safe crossing procedures: Use crosswalks; wait for corners; and look left, right and left again before crossing.
- Stick reflective tape onto costumes to make your child more visible. Also have him or her carry a flashlight.
- Make sure costumes and shoes are the correct size to prevent tripping. Use face paint and leave the masks at home: They can obstruct vision.
- If an older child is venturing out without supervision, ask that he or she go with a group, discuss the route and agree on a curfew. Give older kids cell phones so they can stay in touch.
- Avoid dark streets and visit well lit homes
- View your kids' loot before they eat it. Avoid homemade treats from people you don't know

If you're driving:

- Be alert for children and eliminate in-car distractions.
- Drive slowly.
- Practice extra caution at intersections and corners.
- Pull in and out of driveways carefully

If you're passing out treats at home:

- Keep your home brightly lit indoors and outside.
- Clear debris and other obstacles from your lawn, sidewalks and steps.
- Opt for battery-operated candles in jack-o'-lanterns or other areas where costumed trick-or-treaters might stand.
- Keep pets kenneled or in another room.

Sacramento Center for Innovation (SCI)

The City, in partnership with CSUS and the Power Inn Alliance is preparing the Sacramento Center for Innovation (SCI) Specific Plan that calls for the redevelopment of approximately 240 acres of land.

The plan area is located southeast of CSUS and west of the Granite Park Regional Park Development Area. The area is bounded by U.S. Highway 50 on the north, Union Pacific rail lines on the west, Power Inn Road on the east, and the Union Pacific rail crossing at Power Inn Road at the south.

The SCI Specific Plan implements the City of Sacramento's General Plan and serves as a tool to guide the orderly development of land in the plan area. The area is envisioned as a hub for innovative business and clean technology industries, and the Specific Plan establishes planning and development standards to realize this vision. The plan will guide land use, development standards, urban design, public facilities, utilities, and circulation improvements that are proposed in the Specific Plan area.

Election 2014: New Voting Laws Will Affect College-Glen's Representation

Recent changes in election law will have a significant impact on College-Glen's representation at the State level.

The new open primaries law initiated by Proposition 14 (2010) will apply for the first time to College-Glen's Senate seat in 2014. Qualified candidates of all parties appear on a single, combined primary ballot, and voters may vote for any candidate. The top two vote-getters, regardless of party, advance to the November general election for a run-off, where two candidates from the same party could face one another. This process applies to state officials, including the Governor, members of the state legislature, and others, plus members of the U.S. Congress.

On the June 2014 primary ballot, College-Glen voters may have to choose between two Senate candidates who have previously represented College-Glen in the Assembly. Assembly Members Roger Dickinson and Richard Pan, both Democrats, are exploring runs in Senate District 6, which is currently represented by Senator Darrell Steinberg. If they both run, they will face off under the new open primaries law. College-Glen is currently represented by Assembly Member Roger Dickinson (AD 7) while Assembly Member Pan serves the southern Sacramento region (AD 9).

A new term limits law will also have a major impact. Proposition 28 (2012) reduced the maximum number of years a state legislator may serve from 14 to 12, but permits a member to serve the full number of years in the same house. Previously, legislators were capped at serving eight years in the state Senate and six years in the Assembly. Therefore, it is possible that whoever wins the 2014 Assembly District 7 election could remain in that office until 2026!

Bancroft's Lunch Waste Recycles into Natural Gas

Bancroft students are participating in California's effort to convert waste-to-energy. Currently, Atlas Disposal is processing all of Bancroft students' lunch waste at the County's previous South Area Transfer Station location on Fruitridge and Florin-Perkins Road. Atlas has a clean air partnership with Clean World, BioCNG, and Clean Energy. They are hopeful that this opportunity will translate in to a future of economic and ecologic sustainability for Sacramento and California. The program is designed to assist California in its goal of reducing pollution by converting waste products into renewable forms of energy. At the Atlas facility, the goal is to take organic waste products that would otherwise go into a landfill and feed it into their anaerobic digester. The digester converts the waste products to natural gas which is used to power public and private vehicles previously powered by diesel fuel.

Currently the Atlas digester is processing 25 tons a day with a capacity of 100 tons a day. Approximately two to three tons of food waste will produce 50 gallons of gas. For the past two years the CGNA has been working with Atlas Disposal, the Bancroft Elementary School students, administration, faculty, and staff to sort and deliver the school's food waste to the Atlas digester. The left over fruits, vegetables, meat, dairy, soiled paper and other materials are being processed into reusable forms thereby reducing pollution. According to Atlas, 60 percent of what was collected at Bancroft went to the anaerobic digester and was processed into a compressed natural gas to power Atlas trucks the other 40 percent was recycled for other uses. Atlas Disposal and other supporters of the anaerobic digestion and renewable energy programs hope that their project can become a model to document the benefits of clean air partnerships between private and public entities. The Association is pleased to be part of this process and thanks Atlas for their effort to develop the waste-to-energy program.

Leaf Season Starts November 1 for Residential Yard Waste Collection

City of Sacramento residential customers can legally place yard waste piles in the street for collection during the City's designated leaf season of November, December and January. The first day yard waste piles can be placed on the street for collection is Friday, November 1, 2013. The last day piles can be placed on the street will be Friday, January 31, 2014.

Weekly yard waste container collection will continue year-round on your regular collection day. Leaf pile pickup typically occurs every 7 to 10 days and will usually not occur on your regular collection day.

The City encourages residents to use the container first then create a pile. By using the container along with the pile crews can clear streets faster and the Claw may come through your neighborhood more frequently.

Claw Schedule

Pile collection by the Claw is unpredictable and varies due to weather and the amount of material on the streets. City crews work rain or shine six-days-a-week, including holidays. Stormy weather or days with high volume piles in one neighborhood may impact the speed of clearing an area and moving to the next neighborhood.

From October 28th 2013 through January 31, 2014 customers can get an estimate of when pile collection will occur in their neighborhood by visiting www.sacreecycle.org or calling 311. A new Address Search feature will give users the last day that piles were collected on their street, and an estimate of when the Claw will return for the next pile pickup.

We have heard that some neighbors work together to share space in their containers on collection day. If you regularly fill your recycling container every week you can request an additional container for just \$1.76 per month by calling 311.

Landscaping for Glenbrook Easement

Since the mid 1990s the CGNA has been suggesting the establishment of a garden under the Western Power Authority power lines encompassing the Glenbrook Park River Access. This park would feature plants similar to those found in College Greens and Glenbrook gardens primarily Rhododendrons, Camellias, and Azaleas (RCA). The Association suggested low-level trees to shade the plants and a meandering decomposed granite-walking path to section off small adjacent gardens along the easement between the American River and La Riviera Drive. The Association also suggested the use of decomposed granite and compacted soil around the plants with automatic bubblers to reduce maintenance and conserve water. However, Councilmember McCarty and the City staff have consistently declined to support the Association proposal instead insisting on the use of drought resistant plants and placing the responsibility of garden maintenance on the Association.

The Association believes that a drought resistant garden is not representative of our community and would require a level of maintenance that is beyond what the City can reliably provide or what the Association can be expected to offer or even supplement. The Association cites the landscaping along the north side of Folsom Boulevard at Power Inn/Howe Avenue as an example of drought resistant plants being used in public places without regular maintenance. The landscaping is overgrown by weeds and is both unattractive and infringing on the pedestrian walking area.

The Association has advised Councilmember Kevin McCarty that they do not support a drought resistant garden. In addition, the CGNA has expressed concern regarding the City's ability to provide adequate maintenance to appropriately care for a drought resistant garden. The Association will continue to support an RCA neighborhood garden.

Association Supports City's Sign Ordinance

In 2012, the Power Inn Alliance distributed a flyer to their membership that included a photo citing the signage on Folsom Boulevard at Julliard Drive, as a classic example of "advertising overload." Subsequently, the CGNA shared the flyer with area businesses and most agreed to voluntarily remove all signs that were not in compliance with the City of Sacramento's sign ordinance. However, some business owners on the south side of Folsom Boulevard were less receptive to the request. Got Muscle has taken issue with the City's sign ordinance and as a result the City has suspended their current ordinance until the dispute is resolved.

What does this mean to our community? Since the suspension of the City's sign ordinance, Got Muscle has placed four "A" frame signs in front of their store in addition to their window signs. There are over 50 storefronts on the north side of Folsom Boulevard between Notre Dame and Julliard. If each business put four signs out similar to how Got Muscle has on their frontage stretch, the area between Julliard and Notre Dame along the north side of Folsom could have as many as 200 flapping banners, pennants, streamers and "A" frame signs and the City would have no means of dealing with the clutter and related visual blight.

The Association concurs with the Power Inn Alliance's observation that the advertising overload clutters up a neighborhood and believes that our community is better served by sign limits. As such, the Association is opposing the suspension of the City's current sign ordinance on the basis that the residents have a right to an uncluttered and visually appealing community.

Dog Walkers - Keep your Dogs Leased for their Safety and the Safety of Others!

The Association has been asked to remind dog owners to please keep their dogs on a leash when working in their front yard as well as when walking your dog around the neighborhood. A resident was walking their dog through the neighborhood when an unleashed dog came up and attacked it. In this case the unleashed dog left its yard in order to attack the dog being walked on a leash. As the Association understands the leash law, residents may have their dogs off-leash in their front yard provided the animal does not leave the yard. If the animal does leaves the yard, unleashed, the owner can be charged, and is liable for any damage resulting from the failure to keep the animal leashed. Also, please remember to pick-up after your pet/s.
