Exciting Start to the School Year By Ellen Cochrane, Area 2 Trustee, SCUSD

First days of school are filled with promise and excitement. This year Sacramento City Unified School District is bursting with both. Our new superintendent, Jorge Aguilar, began to work on his plans and programs even before his official start date. Commuting from Fresno since May, he laid the foundation for strategies to give all students the greatest amount of post-secondary choices from the widest amount of options.

On the first day of school Superintendent Aguilar announced the Graduation Task Force which will study the impacts of low graduation rates on the Sacramento Community and develop recommendations for improvement. Twenty community members will serve on the Task Force and will work in collaboration with the Superintendent to issue recommendations to the Board of Education in December 2017.

"We are choosing to talk about graduation rates," said Superintendent Aguilar. "This is a moral issue. Our system must work for all students not just those that understand how to navigate and how to advocate on their behalf. It has to work for any of our students irrespective of parental levels of involvement, engagement, or empowerment."

Elizabeth Henrikson and Rebecca Siegert won top honors as Sacramento City Unified teachers of the year. Henrikson is a beloved English teacher at Sutter Middle School and Siegert is an AP teacher at Rosemont High School. Siegert was also chosen as one of two Sacramento County teachers of the year and will go on to represent SCUSD in the statewide competition.

Keeping Our Children Safe During these Tough Times

Sacramento County public schools have so many outstanding teachers. Fifteen of them were recognized at a Gala Awards Dinner in August, and two were chosen to represent Sacramento County at the statewide level. The two honorees are Rebecca Siegert McGill and Jeff Zahniser.

Rebecca Siegert McGill may be familiar to many CGNA residents because she is a teacher at Rosemont High School. She teaches 12th grade and AP English and serves as senior project coordinator. In that capacity she truly gets to know each of her students on a personal level, helping them achieve their goals and overcome their obstacles. Ms. McGill says "I have one of the most rewarding jobs in the world...I challenge all of my students to push themselves to succeed in ways they perhaps never thought were possible."

"Chef" Jeff Zahniser is a Culinary Arts teacher at Leo A. Palmiter Junior/Senior High School. Many of his students have had difficulties in their previous school environments, and Chef Z says he can relate because he felt the same way when he was in school. A graduate of the Culinary Institute of America, he has trained chefs for some of the most prestigious restaurants in California, but he has found his passion working at Palmiter and helping his students prepare for careers in the food service/hospitality industry. Chef says "I support my students unconditionally and they know they can count on me."

Sac State Building State-of-the-Art Science Complex By Dixie Reid

Sacramento State recently broke ground on a new \$90 million Science Complex, which marks the start of a new era for the University. The sleek, 96,631-square-foot structure have glass-walled research and teaching labs, putting science on display to the outside world. It'll be the first new classroom building since Mariposa Hall in 2000 and, when it opens in June 2019, will set the standard for educating the scientists of tomorrow and engaging the greater Sacramento community.

The state-of-the-art complex will have 30 cuttingedge biology and chemistry labs outfitted with the latest instruments; a 2,500-square-foot planetarium with 120 seats for full-dome, high-definition "sky shows," and a roll-back rooftop observatory housing Sac State's two telescopes for viewing the night sky. The new building is located immediately next to the Hornet Bookstore.

Among the features of the five-story Science Complex:

- Clustered laboratory spaces will increase collaboration between the various academic disciplines.
- Shared study spaces will allow students to interact with each other outside the classroom.
- It'll meet the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED Gold certification standards.
- The Science Plaza will feature educational displays of interest to schoolchildren and the Sac State community.

The terrace will be a sustainable mini park that will help to insulate a section of the building and capture storm water runoff.

The California State University (CSU) allocated \$70.5 million for the Science Complex. Sacramento State is raising \$20 million from private sources for equipment and furnishings. To learn more, please visit www.csus.edu/ science/.

That describes members of SCOE Community School class of 2017, many of whom traveled more than an hour each day to get to school, complete their assignments, and juggle myriad family responsibilities at home. Their graduation ceremony was held at the beautiful outdoor garden of the Sierra Health Foundation with hundreds of joyful family members and friends present.

Guest speaker Brian Bedford, CEO of Align Capitol Region, inspired the graduates with his own story: one of four children of a single parent; he was inspired and encouraged by his McClatchy high school English teacher as well as his football and basketball coaches. He went on to UC Berkeley where he was the first African American quarterback in the school's history. After graduating and earning advanced degrees, he worked for Apple and Intel and later became a professor and dean at Cosumnes River College. Mr. Bedford reminded the graduates that "failure is an experience not a person." Many famous people "failed" before they were successful: Michael Jordan was cut from his high school basketball team and Walt Disney went bankrupt 7 times before opening Disneyland.

After accepting their diplomas and the traditional tassel flip, the graduates joined their families for more photos and a wonderful lunch provided by the SHF. We thank them for their generous assistance in making this day extra special for our graduates.

Jobs for California and Tackling the Opioid Epidemic

Thank you to everyone who stopped by office hours at the Clunie Community Center patio! I always appreciate meeting you and getting feedback. As the fall season approaches, I wanted to share some exciting updates on bills I've been working on to wrap up this legislative session.

In our public universities, an unprecedented number of jobs are lost each year to outsourcing. I authored AB 848 to prohibit the University of California (UC) and California State University (CSU) from contracting services performed by workers outside the United States. This bill protects California jobs and California's workforce.

As I've mentioned before, Sacramento has recently welcomed many Special Immigration Visa (SIV) holders, who worked with our military in combat situations and are escaping war and persecution. AB 343 allows us to invest in California's economy by granting in-state tuition rates for SIV holders, just like our veterans. Through a streamlined residency verification process, we will be able to connect these brave and bright individuals with opportunities for gainful employment in California.

Finally, as we are aware, the opioid epidemic is a devastating problem which urgently needs assistance for both prevention and treatment. I stay fiercely committed to my bill AB 1512, the Opioid Addiction Prevention and Rehabilitation Act. A small wholesale surcharge on opioids will generate essential funding for addiction, prevention, and rehabilitation services.

Airport Parking Maps Online with Available

Spaces Identified From the Desk of Supervisor Susan Peters Going to the airport and wondering where to park? A new map on the Sacramento International Airport parking webpage can show you what parking spaces are available, and where!

This parking page graphic uses a green-yellow-red scale, with green indicating ample availability, yellow showing limited availability and red indicating almost full. The map also shows the number of spaces available at each parking facility. When a lot or the parking garage fills and closes, the map shows it as closed.

These maps are updated dynamically on the website and are refreshed every five minutes. Travelers are encouraged to check the website for the latest parking information before they enter the airport, as parking conditions change quickly.

There is no app available with this parking information; it is only available via the airport website but it can be viewed on a smart phone or tablet. For more information, please visit sacramento.aero/smf/.

And remember effective November 1st through February 28, 2018, wood burning is restricted in the City of Sacramento as well as in the unincorporated area plus the cities of Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Folsom, Galt, Isleton, and Rancho Cordova in accordance with air quality regulations.

These restrictions are designed to improve our area's air quality and applicable to fireplaces, wood stoves, fire pits or chimneys. Implementation of these restrictions has helped reduce pollution and allowed our area to stay in compliance with federal air quality standards.

Being Prepared can Reduce Impact of Natural Disasters

Sacramento is a relatively safe place to live, but an emergency or natural disaster can happen almost anywhere. It makes sense to be prepared with a few basic necessities and some good information – just in case.

On the West Coast, the most likely natural disasters are wildfires, earthquakes and flooding. Sacramento has strengthened its levees in recent years but is still at a greater risk for flooding than most U.S. metropolitan areas. We're more likely to experience winter storms or summer heat waves that could cause an interruption of electric service.

In the event of a power outage, SMUD workers restore service as quickly as possible. Before storms occur, we urge customers to become familiar with the location of their service panel and how to operate your circuit breaker. It's also a good idea to prepare a basic emergency kit and store it in an accessible place.

The emergency kit should contain:

- Flashlight
- · Bottled water
- Extra batteries
- · Wind-up clock
- · Manual can opener
- · Battery-powered radio or television

If stormy weather knocks down a power line, call SMUD at 1-888-456-7683 or 911 immediately. In the meantime, assume the line is dangerous and stay away from it. Do not remove limbs or other debris from power lines.

SMUD offers storm tips brochures in several languages: English, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Hmong, and Russian. If you'd like to have a brochure mailed to you or your organization, call 1-888-742-7683.

It doesn't cost much or take much time to be prepared – just in case.

34th Annual Rugby Tournament January 27th & 28th

BAC Soccer

The arrival of professional soccer has more youth and their parents interested in youth soccer. The British American Club (BAC), the oldest youth soccer club in Sacramento, has been fielding youth soccer for the College Greens and Glenbrook youth since the early 1960's. This year our BAC league has grown to 36 teams with 390 players. Parents see soccer as a healthy and affordable after school activity. Traditionally the season begins in September and runs through mid-November.

The league had hoped to bring the Friday evening under 6 co-ed games back to south field at Oki Park. The City met with the league and set into place a plan to restore the field. Unfortunately, the extent of the damage from the drought, gophers, and years of neglect were too much for a quick fix.

The under-6 co-ed teams will continue to play at Isadore Cohen (9025 Salmon Falls Drive off of La Riviera Drive) until the City and the league can make the South-Oki field safe for play. The under-6 co-ed games stress sportsmanship and sharing with no score keeping. Parents support and encourage players on both the home team and the opposing team.

Saturday soccer is for the older youth. The U-10 will play on the north field at Oki and the U-12, U-14, U-16 and U-19 will play at Jefferson Park 2635 Chestnut Hill Drive. The league has teams for both girls and boys. The games are more structured and competitive. All games are entertaining and open to the community. Why Are My Auto Insurance Rates Rising?

The cost and frequency of auto insurance claims are rising and auto insurance rates are increasing industry-wide as a result. Here are some of the reasons behind rising car insurance premiums:

More Miles Driven - Lower gas prices in recent years mean many American families can afford to drive more. But increased time on the road leads to more accidents and more insurance claims, and insurance rates are adjusting throughout the country to better cover these expected costs.

Distracted driving - According to a State Farm survey, almost one-third of drivers access the internet while driving, and 10 percent record video with their phones. Even voice-activated car commands can divert cognitive abilities and attention. Rethink using the phone while driving, and don't attempt anything else, such as eating or changing radio stations or podcasts. The highest proportion of distracted drivers involved in fatal crashes are 15- to 19-year-olds.

Rising repair costs - Parking sensors, lane-departure warnings, and even stronger materials are now widely available on many vehicles. While those smarter sensors and stronger devices can help improve safety, they are also more expensive to repair. Since 2005, the cost of body work has risen nearly 40 percent more than overall inflation, and the size of collision claims increased 8.2 percent from 2014 to 2016.

- Evaluate how increasing your deductible would reduce your monthly premium.
- Consider taking a defensive driving course or decreasing coverage on older vehicles.

Call the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital at (530) 752-1393 Monday through Friday from 8am-5pm to make an appointment. Appointments are scheduled for 30 minutes though frequently run much shorter, with the actual blood donation lasting only 5-7 minutes. We look forward to seeing you for a swell evening to benefit the animals.



Time to Replace your Alarm Batteries and Fire Extinguishers



Area safety will be a key issue at the CGNA October Annual Meeting.


The Fire Department wants to remind all those who still have the older battery-operated smoke alarms that it is time to replace the batteries. If you have installed the new 10-year battery operated smoke alarms your batteries should still be good. The Sacramento Fire Department (SFD) advises you to check to be sure all of your smoke alarms are fully operational.

If you do not have a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and garage you should add that to your safety list. The SFD recommends that you err on the side of safety and consider the functional life of a fire extinguisher to be one to two years. Over time, the chemicals in the extinguisher settle to the bottom making the unit less effective. If a unit is more than three years old it may still be functional but it most likely will not be effective in extinguishing a fire.

If you have a fireplace, have it checked regularly and have the fire extinguishers close at hand. The SFD encourage fire prevention over firefighting.

Household Junk Pick-up ends October 30th

You have until the end of October to arrange for a free pick-up of household junk. Beginning in November, the City will suspend use of the Claw for household junk and put all equipment back in operation for Loose-in-the-Street Pick Up which operates through February 2018. The one-free dump coupon and two curbside pick-ups (for appliances, TV's, computers, and other e-waste) per calendar year will not be affected by the change in the Claw program. Loose-in-the-street Pick-Up Resumes November 1st

Starting November 1st City residents will again be able to place yard waste piles in the street for collection. The City's designated leaf season is November through January. The program goal is to provide street pick-up at least every 7 to 10 days. However, loose-in-the street pick-up will not necessarily occur on our regular collection day.

The City is encouraging everyone to fill their container before creating a pile. By using the container along with the loose-in-the street pile, crews can clear streets faster and the Claw may come through your neighborhood more frequently.



Street pick-up may be unpredictable due to weather and the volume of material on the streets. City crews are scheduled to work six-days-a week, rain or shine, including holidays. Heavy rain and wind or days with high volume piles in one neighborhood may affect the speed of clearing an area and moving to the next neighborhood.

Starting the last week in October through the end of January customers should be able to get an estimate on when street collection will occur in their neighborhood by visiting www.sacrecycle.org or calling 311. The address search feature should be able to give homeowners the last day that piles were collected on their street and an estimate of when the next pickup will occur. POD Cameras Continue to Benefit City/County

Before Interim Police Chief Brian Louie retired he arranged to have signs installed for our five Police Observation Device (POD) cameras to reinforce the presence of our 24-hour POD Surveillance Cameras. In addition, the signs document that they are a partnership between the College Greens and Glenbrook neighborhoods, the City of Sacramento, and the Sacramento Police Department. We are pleased to report that Chief Daniel Hahn approved the action and the signs went up this month.

Recently the City/County's POD cameras have been credited with solving a number of area crimes. This past week the PODs were credited with the capture of a double homicide suspect. Closer to the neighborhood, a stolen car was identified in the County, chase ensued, and the vehicle and thief passed the Howe Avenue POD on the way to the American River Access. The suspects exited the vehicle with one attempting to flee the scene via the America River. The suspects were captured.

Less Significant Crime Reported This Summer Than Last Summer By Ron Alvarado

Reported crimes in the College Greens/College Glen neighborhoods were slightly lower this summer when compared to both last summer and the summer of 2015. From June through August of this summer, some 62 crimes were reported in the following categories while during the summer of 2016 88 crimes were reported within the same categories, and 93 reported crimes during the same period (June through August) of 2015, according to Sac PD crime mapping statistics.

This may not represent all crimes committed, only those reported. It is important to keep your cars locked when in the driveway or on the street, as motor vehicle theft remains a consistently high crime in our neighborhoods.

Association Asks City to Reconsider Their Winter Water Schedule

The Association has asked that the City to reconsider their winter water policy and research the possibility that it would better serve the needs of Sacramento residents to water three times a week or every other day during the wet winter months rather than restrict watering to one day a week. If residents go to one day a week watering, are we sacrificing the opportunity to increase our ground water supply?

During the winter, the State releases excess water to make space for the spring runoff. If residents water their bushes, trees, and lawns with this excess water during the winter they will be using water that may otherwise be allowed to flow out to the ocean. The Association wonders if the City's water table would benefit more from residents watering their yards several times a week during the winter months rather than watering one day a week? Would watering during the winter months help to replenish the City's ground water for the future? By asking everyone to reduce watering during the winter are we ignoring the opportunity to capture the excess water that would to aid in replacing our much-needed ground water supply before the next drought?

Association Asks Again for a Crosswalk at Mediterranean-West

The Association has again asked the City for a crosswalk at the intersection of La Riviera and Mediterranean-west. The City's position continues to be that the intersection is too dangerous for a crosswalk. The Association position is that the City has a duty to take action to adequately reduce the level of danger at the intersection for pedestrians, bicyclists, and vehicles. The CGNA believes the City should install the necessary devices to make the intersection safe enough for a crosswalk.

Association Comments on Housing for the Homeless

The Association was invited to participate in a Homelessness Solutions Ad Hoc Committee hosted by the Power Inn Alliance. The topic was proposals for City funded housing for the homeless. Presenters Emily Halcon, Homelessness Services Coordinator for the City and Jaycob Bytle, Deputy Director of Communications for Mayor Steinberg discussed proposed ordinances for City funded housing for the homeless. At the conclusion of the meeting the presenters requested comments. The Association submitted the following written comments to the Mayor and members of the City Council.

If public funds are to be used for housing/shelters for the homeless, the ordinance should include funding for the following provisions:

The benefactors of the housing program who are physically and mentally able be mandated to provide community service for the benefit of the community and/or participate in an educational program designed to transition them to employment and independence through education in exchange for food and shelter.

A City funded maintenance program to maintain facilities both in-side and out-side at a level equal or superior to the surrounding area.

Twenty-four-hour constant visible City funded security patrol for the surrounding area of each support facility.

A companion ordinance prohibiting camping/sleeping within the City limits at any time of the day or night.

A companion ordinance prohibiting scavenging of private and public recycling containers that includes the donation of all the CRV recyclable items found in the possession of a violator, at the time of the citation, to the homeless program.

Ms. Halcon, has agreed to attend our Annual Meeting on October 26th and briefly share the work of her office related to assistance for the homelessness as well as participate in the open forum.
