

COVID-19 Vaccine Update

Our best hope for resuming normal activities is effective and widespread vaccine distribution. Sacramento County moved to the Red Tier in March and we hope to make it to the Orange Tier in late April or early May. Recently, the State of California partnered with Blue Shield of California to handle the vaccination distribution between county public health agencies and healthcare partners such as Kaiser and Dignity Health. Each week, the number of vaccines distributed to Sacramento County Public Health (SCPH) and their healthcare partners changes, but SCPH usually receives 13,000 to 18,000 doses.

As of April 15, Sacramento County residents aged 16 and older are eligible for vaccination. At this time, individuals 16 and 17 years old are only eligible for the Pfizer vaccine. Vaccinations are free and available regardless of immigration status or insurance coverage. You can register for an appointment at www.saccounty.net/COVID-19. For those with health insurance, coverage information may be requested as part of the appointment scheduling process. Sacramento Regional Transit is offering free rides to COVID-19 vaccine appointments.

Due to the limited amount of vaccines coming directly to SCPH, appointment availability may be limited, and it may take a while for you to get in to an open appointment slot. Pop-Up Vaccination Clinics and locations are being added as vaccinations become available and the County is working to establish these clinics quickly and equitably to the residents of Sacramento County. The goal is that everyone who is eligible and willing will receive the vaccine as quickly as possible!

CGNA's Family Night Out Remains on Hold

The CGNA National Family Night Out continues to be on hold. If we were to have a National Family Night out it would be on Friday July 2, 2021. Currently the California Department of Public health has specific requirements for all people in California when they are outside of the home. In addition, Sacramento County and the City of Sacramento have mandates and suggested restrictions that have caused the CGNA Board to be reluctant to schedule our National Family Night Out at this time. The current Sacramento County COVID-19 Community Event/Gathering Application prohibits indoor gatherings and allows outdoor gathering as long as event organizers and those attending strictly comply with all the requirements. The requirements include everyone must wear a face covering at all times and ensure social distancing between all staff and attendees. The event must not encourage or lead to mingling and interaction of people from different households, and if food is available there can be no gathering where the food is served, and a common eating area must not to be used. In addition, in the event that federal, state, or local conditions or guidance changes subsequently, the organizers may be asked to postpone or cancel the event in the interest of public health and safety.

Our attendance has been averaging about 400 to 500 guests. It may be difficult to comply with the face covering and social distance mandates even in Glenbrook Park. Add to this the that the permit may be pulled at any time dependent on the number of current active COVID-19 cases. All scheduled events are tentative until they are over. As such, the CGNA National Family Night Out continues to be on hold until further notice.

SCOE Partners with Safeway for Vaccination Clinic

We are pleased to share that thanks to a great collaboration with Sacramento County Public Health and Safeway, the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) was able to host a vaccination clinic at our Conference Center during the months of March and April. We operated the clinic Thursdays through Saturdays and were able to serve an average of 300 people each day of operation.

Initially, our clinic focused on serving educators and childcare staff, and eventually served members of the Rancho Cordova community. For the local community, we launched outreach to our neediest individuals to make sure they had an opportunity to get a vaccination. As a result of this partnership, we served between 200 to 300 people per day and more than 1,800 were vaccinated.

We are grateful to Safeway and Sacramento County Public Health for helping us meet this great need in our community. Our clinic – no doubt - helped us with the reopening of schools in our county. It helped give people a sense of safety and more comfort in doing their work, for both for educators and childcare workers.

Sac State 'CARmencement' Paves Celebratory Road for Graduates in the Pandemic-

COVID-19 safety restrictions and concerns have kept Sacramento State from holding a traditional in-person Commencement ceremony in 2020 and 2021 at Golden 1 Center, or even outdoors at Hornet Stadium.

Instead, the University has invited '20 and '21 graduates to participate in a celebratory vehicle parade through campus between 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Friday and Saturday, May 21-22.

"I promised that we would meet at Golden 1 Center, and we cannot," said University President Robert S. Nelsen. "All of us want to be together, and we had hoped the pandemic would be gone by now, but it isn't, so we had to pivot."

As many as 4,600 vehicles – each carrying at least one grad and guests – are expected over the two days of CARmencement. Grads are encouraged to wear their cap and gown and to decorate their vehicle. The event will be live-streamed.

CARmencement will begin at the south end of campus, with vehicles following a set route that passes the Sac State Police station, circles behind Hornet Bookstore and the Ernest E. Tschannen Science Complex, then turns west onto Sinclair Drive. The parade splits to deliver graduates to two Recognition Zones before they exit the campus.

In the zones, each graduate will be recognized individually and receive a Hornet Grad Kit, which includes two official Commencement programs and commemorative items from the University.

Along the way, graduates will be treated to live music and several surprises, January - March 2021



including Commencement speeches and videos, and a crowd of faculty, staff, and University administrators celebrating them from socially distanced "cheer dots" along the way.

Bancroft Students Return

Bancroft is proud to report that 73% of its students selected to return to in-person learning beginning in April! Numerous other safety features include: availability of infrared thermometers, masks, and hand-sanitizer; strategically placed plexiglass separators; monitoring person-to-person distancing; installing air purifiers for enhanced room filtration and outdoor hand-washing stations. Last year was the first season the league has missed in the 46 years that area youth have been part of an organized baseball league. On March 21st, construction started for renovations and replacement of the Oki Park Playground. The original playground was first installed in 1992, and it was built and fundraised by community residents, with the City's support and donations from local community businesses at the time. The playground has since served as a gathering space for children and families in the neighborhood to share giggles and smiles!

Amongst the 175 park playgrounds overseen by the City of Sacramento, the Oki Park Playground is the oldest existing playground before this new renovation. This is a well-deserved touch-up for a community amenity that has provided an opportunity for generations of children to play.

This new playground has a Dinosaur Exploration theme, and it has a flying Pterodactyl and T-Rex head, play roof, and deck panels that look like salvage material created for an outpost (pretty cool if you ask me!). There are also large as-life dinosaur bones and skulls for discovering, climbing, and balancing on, and dinosaur eggs. There is an exploration vehicle for two, a rocking event for two, and stepping boulders.

With its new look, the new playground will continue to serve as an opportunity for children to have fun, play outdoors, and get active at the same time!

The new playground was funded with Park Development Impact fees, and we are expecting the completion of the project during the last week of April.

Another Year of Drought Conditions

It appears California is going to be faced with another year of drought conditions. According to the City it takes several years to enter a drought, it also typically takes several years to ease out of a drought. Suggested ways to help save water:

Run the washing machine and dishwasher only when full.

Water the lawn early in the morning or late in the evening on the days prescribed by your water provider.

Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation and keep the soil cool.

Bank of America Financial Center - Perkins Branch is Closing

Area residents with safe deposit boxes in the Perkins Bank of America located at 8363 Folsom Boulevard in Sacramento have been served written notice of the pending closure of the Perkins Bank of America Branch. If you have a safe deposit box in the Perkins Bank of America Branch you have until May 21, 2021 to clear out your box. If you do not claim/ clear the box out, the bank will drill out the lock, box the contents, and hold it in their uninsured storage facility for a period of time. Subsequently, the Bank will "escheat the unclaimed content to the State of California." The Perkins Branch will be closed for all services effective July 25, 2021.

Does Folsom Boulevard have California's Largest Selection of Cannabis. Delivered?

In December 2020, the Folsom Boulevard East Special Planning District (SPD) ordinance established regulations governing development along Folsom Boulevard from 62nd Street to the Union Pacific railroad tracks and from Howe Avenue to Watt Avenue. The goal is to promote a greater mix of land use; maintain and improve the character, quality, and vitality of the area; and ensure compatibility between new nonresidential uses within the area and the surrounding residential uses and schools. Prohibited uses include check-cashing centers, somatic practitioner's establishments, cannabis dispensaries, and some tobacco retailing.

When a banner advertising cannabis delivery recently appeared on an unused property within the Folsom Boulevard East SPD, the CGNA reached out to Councilmember Eric Guerra for assistance. His



office swiftly looked into the property and determined The banner was promptly removed. Thank you to Councilmember Guerra and that there is no cannabis business using that building. his staff for responding so quickly to our neighborhood concern.

Neighborhood Maintenance and Upgrades

The streets of College Greens and Glenbrook are active with infrastructure upgrades. Cables are being pulled in the streets, power lines are being replaced, the cell towers are being upgraded, and area trees trimmed. As a result, some of the streets are being dug up and closed to traffic. Please reduce your speed when in the work areas.

Student Rentals an Issue for Neighbors

Complaints about college student rentals continue to be an issue in the neighborhood. College Greens and Glenbrook are designed to be single family homes. There are some limits on residency though there is no enforcement. With the proximity to Sacramento State, a number of homes have been purchased and are being used as rentals for college students. Some parents will purchase a home for their child in place of renting space or living in a dormitory. The student then rents out the extra rooms for added income. It is not uncommon for the maintenance on these properties to be sub-standard, have excessive number of cars, and hold multiple parties. Neighbors complain but little action is taken unless there is a major issue.





The Association believes it is time for the City to address this neighborhood issue and we are asking our Councilmember to assist these neighbors.
