Changes for the 2022-2023 School Year

Principal Bernie Evangelista will be stepping into a new role next school year as CMP's Director of Program, a network level role that supports the implementation of CMP's Montessori Program across all CMP schools. Bernie has been with CMP since its inception in 2001. She served as the Principal of the Capitol Campus since 2006 and formed an exceptional team. During her tenure, CMP Capitol grew from 130 students to more than 340; expanded grade levels from K-6th Grade to TK-Middle School; and moved the campus two times within a span of four months! We cannot thank Bernie enough for making CMP Capitol the amazing school it is today. Shannon Schmidt, CMP Capitol's Dean of Students will step in the Principal role. She completed her Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Development at UC Davis, her Multiple Subject Credential at Sacramento State University, and her 6-12 Montessori certificate through the Montessori Teachers College. Shannon joined the CMP community in 2005 first at the CMP-Elk Grove Campus where she taught in both 6-9 and 9-12 classrooms, then went on to spend 5 years at the Capitol Campus teaching in a 9-12 classroom

Katey Dodd will step into the Dean role at Capitol. Katey has been with CMP the past 8 years as a teacher in the Upper Elementary program and later as Middle School Teacher. She completed the 6-12 Montessori Training and the Secondary Training. Katey has an Administrative Credential, a Masters in Montessori Education and a Masters in Instructional Leadership.

SCUSD Update By Leticia Garcia, SCUSD

As the 2021-22 school year comes to an end, I look forward to starting the 2022-23 school year with more stability and normalcy for students, parents, teachers and staff. Like so many districts across the state, this school year was mired in the unpredictability of COVID. We also had a labor strike that resulted in agreements to fairly compensate our teachers and staff. One highlight this year is that 6th grade students once again had the opportunity to participate in a week-long field trip to Sly Park for outdoor science learning. With COVID funds, this opportunity is available to all 6th grade students in the district—and will be funded through 2024. Looking ahead, the Summer Matters program will begin at some school sites in late June to provide students with additional opportunities to catch up and/or accelerate their learning and be better prepared for the year ahead. Over the next five years, the District will begin to expand Transitional Kindergarten (TK) to serve eligible 4 year-olds. TK will be available for free to all 4 year-olds regardless of family income. Also expanding will be enrichment afterschool opportunities for all students, including arts, music and sports at elementary schools. For middle school students, career technical education opportunities will be available—exposing students to college and career options and skills to help them succeed in high school. Mental health continues to be an area of need, and the Board approved funds to hire more counselors, nurses, social workers, and school psychologists to better support students for years to come.

1300 Campaign

Closing the achievement gap is a priority for me. Our board recently approved a resolution to support the 1300 campaign. This campaign, hosted by the Sierra Health Foundation, seeks to ensure that 1300 young men of color graduate high school, attend and graduate from college. Young men of color with college degrees are 38 times less likely to be incarcerated. Our Board committed to implementing the eight strategies in our juvenile hall and community schools (about 1000 students) and support using these strategies through our technical assistance to the 13 school districts in our county, as they seek to close the achievement and opportunity gap for their students.

These strategies include supporting professional development in implicit bias awareness and culturally responsive teaching. Increasing access to mentorship for each student in our SCOE schools. Increasing access to early college courses so students can experience college while in high school, since we know that this exposure can increase the odds that high school students will attend some form of higher education. Providing access to ethnic studies by the required state timeframes (by 2025). Ethnic studies supports cross-cultural understanding and helps students value their own cultural identity while appreciating the differences around them. Hiring more diverse counselors. Reducing suspension for young children of color using restorative justice approaches. Incorporating the A-G requirements as a default curriculum for all students. Developing an organizational racial equity assessment tool to assess how effective these strategies are in improving educational outcomes.

Bancroft Smiling Faces! By Lorena Carrillo, Principal

On Monday, April 18 the face covering mandate was changed from mandated to highly recommended. Students now have the option to wear a face covering. Many families and their students' felt comfortable to remove their face coverings at school. Students were excited to show their smiling faces. Even though the face covering mandate changed, we still have all other safety protocols in place such as hand sanitizer, weekly surveillance testing and maintaining ventilation in the classrooms.

Since the first day of school, we have had many students eat their lunch outside. With additional funds, the district was able to purchase 16 high quality outdoor tables for Bancroft. Now we can have more students enjoy their lunch or just to gather with friends during recess.

In addition to the outdoor tables, we have 3 more water filing stations being installed around the school. The water filling stations enable students to quickly refill their water bottles and help reduce the use of plastic bottles.

We look forward to reestablishing prepandemic school activities though the end of the school year!




The Little League Tradition Continues

Key State and Local Issues

From the Desk of Assemblymember McCarty

Thank you for your continued engagement in your neighborhood. I am honored to continue to serve as your Assemblymember.

Here's an update on some key state and local issues that I'm working on:

Inflation and Rising Gas Prices - We have seen various tax rebate proposals, and I'm working to craft a tax relief plan to help our middle class families confront inflation and gas prices. We need to make sure that our plan helps middle class tax payers and doesn't just benefit oil companies. Stay tuned for much needed tax relief later this summer.

American River Parkway - I'm authoring legislation to improve public safety by cracking down on illegal camping along the Parkway. We all need to work together to address homelessness, but allowing the Parkway to serve as a homeless camp is unacceptable. Our AB 2633 will work in tandem with the \$22 million in Parkway public access improvements we successfully delivered.

After-School Programs - Afterschool programs help kids succeed academically and help parents juggle work responsibilities. But they shouldn't just be a luxury for some. My AB 2507 will make afterschool programs universal and free for all California families.

Last year was a busy one. We had over 3000 calls here out of Station 60! That's a new record for this station. We are currently gearing up for a busy summer. Hopefully not like last year where the parkway kept us busy.

Please know that our residents are allowed to have cooking and warming fires as long as they are in an approved container and off of the ground. If you see smoke coming from the trees along the parkway that could be all that it is, but if you are unsure, please call 911 and we will be happy to respond and check things out.

This time of year is a good time to replace the batteries in your smoke detector or the smoke detector itself and check the expiration dates on your CO detectors to see if they need replacing.

Come out to see and talk with your Fire Department on National Night Out, July 1st, 2022.

Remember to call 311 for any code concerns you have about the neighborhood.

And last, but not least – if you have any questions or concerns, come on by the station.

Keep Cool and Save Money

The days are growing longer and the temperatures are getting warmer, which has many people starting to crank up their air conditioning and look for ways to stay cool. But did you know that you don't have to sacrifice comfort for savings. At SMUD we offer ways that people can stay cool and save money at the same time.

Since we are still experiencing mild weather, now is a good time to be proactive and prepare your house for those hot, summer days. Dirty air filters can add an additional 5-10 percent to your bill so replace your filters regularly and clean your outside unit with warm soapy water. Since fans cost about 90 percent less to operate, turn your ceiling fans to counter clockwise.

If your home is more than 15 years old, it's also a good time to check the attic, windows and doors for leaks. A home can lose up to 20 percent of its heating or cooling through small leaks, which can be easily fixed with weather stripping and caulking.

And Spring is a great time to plant trees in your yard to shade your home. SMUD partners with the Sacramento Tree Foundation to provide free shade trees to our customers so inquire today about which trees are best for your home.

Once those hot temperatures hit, we recommend setting your thermostat at 78 degrees to stay comfortable and save. For each two degrees that you can adjust your thermostat, you can save 5-10 percent on cooling costs. There are several smart thermostat options that help you set it and forget it.

And remember that summer rates start June 1st. So, we encourage residents to do their chores in the morning or after 8 p.m. to save on our time-of-day rate because that's when it's cheapest. Avoid using all large appliances at the same time and shut your drapes to prevent your house from warming up.

We have many other energy saving tips and opportunities for rebates on energy saving appliances at smud.org/energytips and smud.org/rebates if you are looking into larger savings ideas.

Every little bit counts. It helps you save on your bottom line and helps us continue to provide clean and reliable power at some of the best rates in California.

Parkway Crisis

As a lifelong resident of Carmichael, my backyard has always been the American River Parkway, and I am gravely concerned about its degradation. This unique natural resource makes our region a special place to live and must be protected.

Last summer, I was in disbelief as fires destroyed roughly 12% of the Parkway. Many of the fires were caused by open flames and cooking, which are not allowed. As a Mile Steward, I have participated in countless cleanups and have seen firsthand the garbage, human waste and destruction to the Parkway from unregulated encampments. Many campers suffer from untreated mental illness or addiction and need to be connected to treatment. Violent incidents are also taking place on the Parkway, including the most recent tragic and senseless death of Emma Roark.

How do we best preserve and protect this sensitive environmental resource while making it safe for everyone to enjoy? The Board of Supervisors approved additional Park Rangers and 10 Navigators to enforce rules and assist campers find services, along with funding for up to 352 motel nights, and an allocation of \$2 million in the current fiscal year to address encampments, wildlife, and environmental crime issues. I am also pleased to announce that Assemblymembers Ken Cooley, Kevin McCarty, and Jim Cooper are introducing AB 2633: Protection of Parklands - Illegal Camping. This bill will allow for the clearing and removal of illegal campsites from special parklands to ensure public safety and preservation for generations to come. This is a vital step forward that must be passed. We need to remove these encampments, while locating the appropriate shelter and treatment to provide the unhoused with opportunities to get the help they need. Something needs to change!

Community Outreach And Compliance Checks Along American River Parkway

On March 1, 2022, Sacramento County Probation Officers along with its partners, including the Sacramento County Regional Parks Rangers, Rancho Cordova Police Department, Sacramento County Sheriff's Office, and State Parole Agents, visited 11 homeless camps along the American River Parkway in Sacramento County. The team, contacted 20 individuals, and conducted eight probation searches and three sexual registrant checks. Everyone was in compliance and no arrests were made. In addition, the Sacramento Sheriff's Department Homeless Outreach Team was part of the effort. The Homeless Outreach Team focuses on building relationships with unhoused individuals and families to help them become self-sufficient, as well as enforcing violations of the law. The team provided resources and potential housing referrals to individuals and families.

Crime Up Over the Same Period Last Year

It is not fun reporting on crime these days, but the statistics are the facts. Reported crime in our neighborhood is up substantially in the nearly three months of 2022 when compared to the same period in 2021. Traffic incidents in our neighborhoods are up just over three times what they were in the same period a year ago, and motor vehicle theft is up more than 10 times. Overall, crime in the College Greens/Glen neighborhoods unfortunately seems to be just like the regional up-tick in Sacramento crime overall. You were eight times more likely to be the victim of a burglary from your car over the past three months then during the same 3-month period in 2021, and nearly 3 times more likely to be the victim of theft this year than during the same period last year. Fortunately for us and our neighbors, we have thus far been spared the tragic and heinous crimes like homicides so far this year that unfortunate other areas have experienced. Nonetheless, while there were only 5 weapons violations crimes reported over the past 3 months in our neighborhoods, this was more than double that crime during the same period in 2021.

Be vigilant, be safe. Watch out for one another, and report crimes and suspicious activity. Together we can help our law enforcement teams combat this unfortunate growing trend.

City Bracing for Drought Conditions

California and Sacramento could be faced with another year of drought conditions. According to the City it takes several years to enter a drought; it also takes several years to ease out of a drought. We have yet to exit the last drought and there is every indication we are about to enter another year of drought. The State and the City are asking everyone to acknowledge the limited resource and to do their part to reduce their water use.

Suggested ways to save water include:

- Run the washing machine and dishwasher only when full.
- Turn the water off when brushing teeth or shaving.
- Take showers instead of using the bathtub.
- · Take shorter showers.
- Water the lawn early in the morning (before 10am) or late in the evening (after 7 pm)
- Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation and keep the soil cool.
- · Water only on your prescribed water days.
