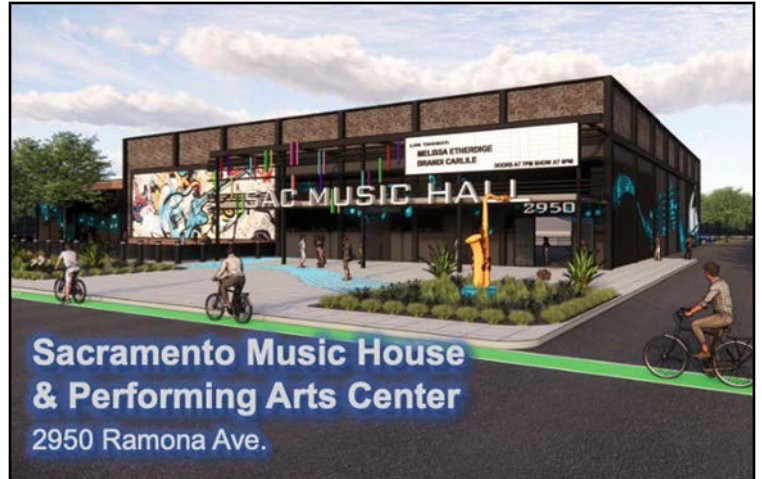
Sacramento Music Hall, Performing Arts Center, and Sit-Down Restaurant Approved

The City Planning and Design Commission has unanimously approved the Sacramento Music Hall and Performing Arts Center project. Set to be located on Ramona Avenue, south of Folsom Boulevard, this indoor live music and performing arts venue will accommodate up to 1,900 guests, with plans to increase capacity to 2,300 when additional parking becomes available. Construction will begin this Summer or Fall, and the center is expected to open in 2024.

Two abandoned industrial warehouses will be redeveloped and combined to create the restaurant, showroom, and performing arts space, maintaining the original project plan. The center will host two to three concerts per week, as well as numerous business and private events. A total of 440 on-site parking spaces will be provided, including special arrival areas for ride-sharing vehicles, EV charging stations, and solar panel-covered shading.

The restaurant plans to open seven days a week, serving lunch and dinner, with typical closing hours around 10:30 PM. It will seat approximately 60 people indoors and 70 people outdoors. To ensure guests can depart in a relaxed manner, the restaurant will operate for 30 to 45 minutes after large shows,



offering time to enjoy refreshments.

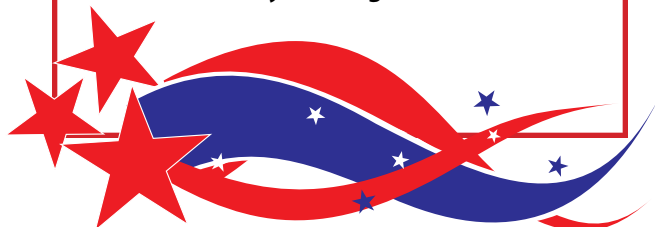
Security cameras and personnel will be in place during concert hours, screening guests and directing traffic in and out of the venue. The security team will also ensure guests do not park on adjacent properties.

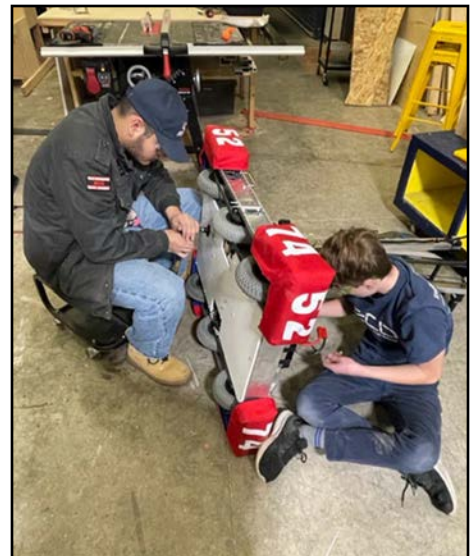


was standing room only in the pool area, and baseball could hear the cheering from down on their field!

SCUSD Board Update

Dear College Glen family, Spring is here! Firstly, the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) website has been updated and now includes my email contact information for anyone who would like to get in touch with me. Our budget is indeed very strong, and we are estimating an additional \$6 million from Prop 28 to help support art and music in our schools. The funding will be determined and allocated by site enrollment. 80% of this funding (over \$4 million) must be spent to hire certificated/classified staff for art and music. I am excited about how this funding will not only enrich the educational outcomes of our students but will also bring new teaching jobs to our district- directly combating the teaching shortage that is plaguing the profession.

Conversations are set to begin with our labor partners, and I am working in partnership with our teachers, staff, and their respective representatives to ensure we move conversations forward with honesty and transparency. The goal is to ensure our students receive the best education in the region, and that is only possible when we provide our students with full-time dedicated teachers committed to their success. I'm excited about the direction that the school board is moving this district, and I encourage community members to attend our school board meetings either in person or via live stream, that take place on the 1st and 3rd of every month. SCOE Transitional Kindergarten

The Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) has long been a state leader in training early care providers on how to deliver high quality care for toddlers and young children. In partnership with schools and childcare providers, SCOE created an early learning roadmap that guides our work. In addition to supporting high quality care the roadmap addresses the need for a diverse and well-trained workforce and ensures a full set of support for children to develop successfully. To that end, SCOE hosts Help Me Grow, a program to catch developmental delays early and get interventions to children within the first five years of life.

Given new investments in the expansion of transitional kindergarten, SCOE is providing support to districts on how to create fun, engaging, developmentally appropriate transitional kindergarten programs and is training new teachers for transitional kindergarten. SCOE is a leader in the new countywide Child Care Coalition dedicated to increasing access to more affordable and high quality childcare and early learning programs.

Outreach to Students Helps Maintain Strong Sac State Enrollment

Universities and colleges nationwide need help with falling enrollment and retention, but Sacramento State this spring exceeded goals and kept scholars on track toward their degrees.

The University is bucking trends by working hard to clear barriers to student registration, said Steven Salcido for Enrollment Management and Student Services. The Student Service Center led efforts to contact thousands of students who risked missing registration deadlines and worked with them to remove obstacles, Salcido said. In all, the campaign placed more than 13,000 phone calls.

Many students needed a reminder to complete the paperwork. Others had more complicated issues, such as financial problems or housing concerns. In most cases, Sac State callers helped them resolve those issues by connecting students with appropriate campus resources.

The effort paid off. More than 70% of students contacted enrolled for the Spring 2023 semester. CSU campuses that continue to experience declining enrollment face significant funding cuts. Sac State has found that sometimes a simple telephone call can change a student's trajectory.

The University's targeted call campaign began in 2020 after pandemic concerns. During the lockdown, officials noticed that many students were missing deadlines for class registration and launched efforts to reach out to them. Now, the University does so in earnest before each semester.

Administrators hope the call campaigns will motivate students to complete the application process as early as possible to avoid last-minute issues that can cause anxiety and interrupt their pursuit of degrees.

Mother Nature definitely has made a more interesting beginning to 2023. It seems like Winter has been a lot longer because of the Atmospheric Rivers and unusually low temperatures through March.

The weather has taken its toll on the bees a well. Our bees are California Bees and not conditioned to this shift in climate conditions. But even so the bees that did survive have been busy raising brood (new bees) and are as strong as ever. These strong colonies of bees combined with our "inside-out" California Spring will make for a very interesting season. The healthy colonies, with large numbers of bees, are happiest when they are out and about. But bees get the urge to swarm when confined to the hive, particularly during the latest rivers of rain. The Beekeeper tries to provide the right amount of space but sometimes bees will be bees and they will swarm. Swarming bees can be intimidating but are generally very docile.

When you see a swarm contact your local beekeeper at (916) 541-0833 or the Sacramento Area Beekeepers Association at <https://sacbeekeepers.org/report-a-swarm>. as soon as possible. It is best to do so before they find a new home which maybe your attic, garbage can, or other unsuitable space and end up costing the homeowner. Timing is of the essence before they take flight again. As beekeepers we ask that you don't spray the bees with the usual insect treatments which makes the bees contaminated and sometimes more agitated.

We kicked off the year in support of our fire department by rolling out a tuition assistance program for Emergency Medical Service trainees. This program's goal is to hire from the communities we serve and creates access to high paying careers.

My office organized a safety and beautification walk down Folsom Boulevard with the Folsom Boulevard Coalition, neighbors, Power Inn Alliance, City traffic safety, and economic development staff to discuss safety concerns and economic opportunities. We had the opportunity to share the need for increased crosswalks and much-needed traffic safety measures onsite to our public works staff. We are also working actively with the coalition to put up utility art wrap boxes to help beautify the corridor.

We continue to make strides to increase affordable and transitional housing in our district. The Council approved \$7.7 million in funding to bring 150 units of affordable housing and workforce housing to assist residents such as schoolteachers and grocery store workers and a 70 unit project home key application at Roadway Inn.

Temporary Shelter in Tiny Homes

Thank you for your advocacy on behalf of your neighborhood. I am honored to serve as your Assemblymember.

I have some positive news to share about our homeless crisis. The state recently announced that Sacramento is one of four cities to be awarded funding to build tiny homes as temporary shelters, primarily at Cal Expo, which was permitted under my legislation that the Governor signed in 2021.

Sacramento plans to give these 350 tiny homes to individuals camping under the highway overpasses and along American River Parkway. Homelessness is a complex issue with many factors and we need many solutions, both long term and short term. While permanent supportive housing is needed, we need to act with urgency now to get people off the streets. Tiny homes are a time-sensitive and cost-effective options that provide immediate relief.

Californians have felt the impact of price gouging at the pump at the hand of oil and gas companies. We all saw record gas prices reach a high of \$6.42 per gallon last fall, a record \$2.61 more per gallon than the national average. I'm proud to report that the Legislature and Governor passed legislation (SBX1) to help consumers with a first in the nation measure that authorizes an independent watchdog to root out unfair profiteering by oil companies and bring down prices at the pump.

Wildlife a Challenge for the Citrus Trees

The citrus trees lining the American River Access pathway were covered for the winter to protect them from extremely cold temperatures. All 15 trees survived their first winter without issue and continued to grow during their first Sacramento spring and summer. This year, prior to winter, the deer came in from the river and began eating away at the trees and their new growth. Branches were broken and bark was stripped from the trees compromising their health. The trees were covered through the winter though consistently required repair.

The covers are being removed now that spring is here, and we must find another way to protect the trees. The Association is researching ways to discourage wildlife from eating the trees and causing further damage.

Storms Provide Much Needed Hydropower

The Sacramento region started the year off with a string of intense storms that seem to be continuing as we usher in Spring.

But there is one bright side to all the rain that we've received during this La Nina year and that's the associated snowpack in the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

What does snowpack in the Sierras have to do with SMUD customers?

Snowpack in the Sierras helps to provide summertime run-off into SMUD's 688-megawatt hydroelectric system, known as our Upper American River Project.

A little-known secret to Sacramento, SMUD operates a series of 12 reservoirs and 9 powerhouses. Known as a stairway to power, this system creates hydroelectricity as the water drops in elevation through the system. It also provides immense recreation opportunities for bikers, campers, rafters, anglers, and more.

In normal water years, SMUD customers get approximately 20 percent of their power from hydroelectricity. It can produce enough electricity to power 180,000 homes.

It's our cleanest and most economical resource that helps us meet the high demand for electricity during the hot summer months. In fact, for every inch of precipitation, SMUD saves \$1 million in avoided power purchase costs, and that is passed on to our customers.

It's also carbon free, which makes it even more important as we make the shift to a zero-carbon economy.

Hydropower provides operational flexibility. As climate change begins to cause severe weather changes and variation in the amount of precipitation we receive, SMUD has a savings account to help us stabilize our power purchases when hydro is low. This helps to provide financial stability and reliable power amongst the changing weather conditions.

An Introduction to the Sacramento Police Department

The Sacramento Police Department, in partnership with the Fire, Code Enforcement, Parking Enforcement, and Animal Control Departments, provides public safety and policing services throughout the City of Sacramento. Led by Chief Kathy Lester, the Police Department is responsible for answering and responding to calls for police service, investigating crimes, building relationships with the community, and training the next generation of law enforcement officers.

Organizationally, the city is broken into six police "districts" with each district subdivided into multiple "beats." The East Command (District 6) which encompasses all parts of the city south of the American River, east of Highway 99, and north of Florin Road, is led by Captain Stephen Moore and Executive Lieutenant Neil Cybulski. The College Glen neighborhood is located within beat 6E and is the geographical responsibility of Acting Lieutenant Sang Park. However, those you will see on the streets or at the coffee shop, and the ones who truly make a difference in your community, are the officers and sergeants who are out there doing the work every day. Each year they have a choice of where they work, and they chose to serve you!

Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, members of the Sacramento Police Department are found throughout the community responding to crises and enhancing public safety. Whether on a holiday, or in a rainstorm, they are out there patrolling the streets and answering calls for help. When you see them, I encourage you to wave, say "Hi," or strike up a conversation, and get to know your men and women in blue.

River City Waterway Alliance Spotlight By Michael Tscheu

One of the great joys of living in the College-Glen neighborhood is the access to the American River Parkway. The Parkway is an amazing amenity for our neighborhood and our city, but the Parkway needs help. There is an incredible amount of trash in the water and throughout the Parkway, much of it out of sight of the bike trail.

In January, a new group was formed to restore and protect Sacramento's waterways. River City Water Alliance (RCWA) is an all-volunteer group that collects and removes trash from the Parkway to preserve and protect the vitality and health of our American River. In recent weeks, RCWA has focused on the Parkway between Watt & CSUS, removing 25,500 lbs. of trash, much of which had been hidden or buried for years.

RCWA routinely partners with the County's Parkway maintenance crew to haul away trash after clean-up events. It is a great example of a public-private partnership that is making an impact.

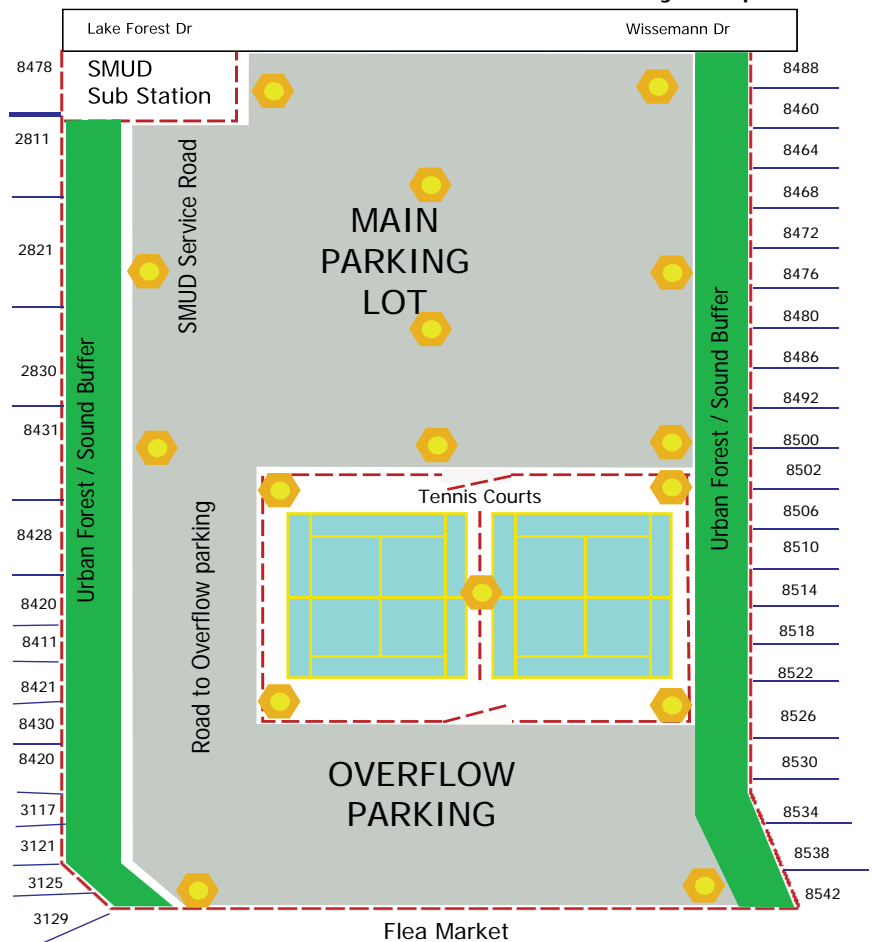

Revisiting the Oki Park Master Plan gets 83% Support

The February 2023 survey asking area residents their position on the current Master Plan for the Oki Park open space have been tallied. 83% of survey respondents supported revisiting the current master plan to address the parking needs, adding pickleball courts, and developing an urban farm.

It has been determined that the Glenbrook Park tennis courts need to be replaced. The Board has recommended that the two Glenbrook courts be replaced with eight pickleball courts to allow for pickleball lessons and tournaments. At the same time the Board asked that two tennis courts be included in the Oki Master Plan to replace those displaced by the proposed pickleball courts. The current proposed use now includes a permanent parking lot with lighting for safety in the north two-thirds of the Oki Park South Easement and two tennis courts (should the two Glenbrook tennis courts be converted to pickleball courts) in the south one-third of the Oki Park South Easement. The Association has suggested the proposed urban forest create a garden of vegetation along the east and west edges of the of the easement as a means of preserving the current vegetation within the encroachments to provide a buffer between the project and the residents on the east and west borders.

Deposits continue to be accepted for the Fall 2022 pre-school and toddler programs. Ms. Paula is the instructor for all three programs. Currently for the Fall 2023 Semester, there are a few openings in the four-day morning preschool which meets Monday through Thursday from 8:30am-11:15am. There are fewer than 12 spaces in the afternoon class which meets from Monday through Friday from 12:00pm to 2:45pm. The Friday morning toddler class meets from 8:30am to 11:15am and has a limited number of openings. A \$50 deposit is required to place a hold on a spot until September when school begins.

City Continues with Drought Guidelines

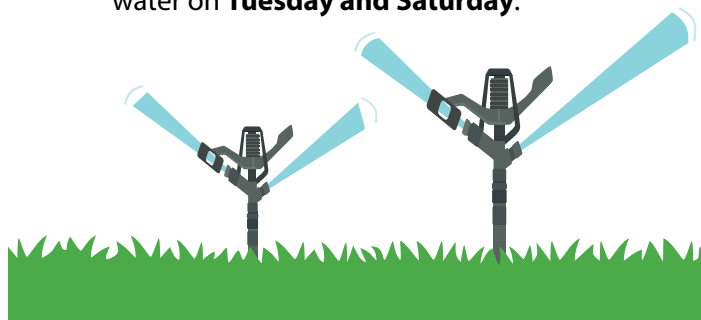
Despite the flooding in California this past winter the City's 311 operators are advising that the residents continue to limit their watering based on the City's drought guidelines. It takes several years to enter a drought and several years to ease out of a drought. Both the City and the state position is that one season of above average rain does not get the state out of a drought that has persisted for years. The storms this season have improved the state's surface water supplies. However, the groundwater basins are still recovering. The State and the City are asking everyone to acknowledge that water is a limited resource and to continue to do their part to reduce their water use.

Suggested ways to save water include:

- Run the washing machine and dishwasher only when full.
- Turn the water off when brushing teeth or shaving.
- Take showers instead of using the bathtub.
- Take shorter showers.
- Water the lawn early in the morning (before 10am) or late in the evening (after 7 pm)
- Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation and keep the soil cool.
- Water only on your prescribed water days.

Household Junk Pick-Up Returns

The City's loose-in-the street pickup has ended and the Household Junk Pickup has resumed. City of Sacramento solid waste/recycling customers may have two free Household Junk Pickups a year per household during the non-leaf season. In addition, customers may request one free dump coupon for self-haul of debris to the Sacramento Recycling and Transfer Station for the Household Junk Pickup Program per calendar year. However, The City asks that piles not be placed out more than 24 hours before the scheduled pick-up.



Appliances, TV's, computers, and other e-waste are no longer acceptable in the Household Junk program. Instead, you may request two curbside pick-ups for Appliances, TV's, computers, and other e-waste during the calendar year.

To request an appointment, customers may call 311, make an online request at www.sac311.org, or use the Sac 311 App for your iPhone or Android. The dump coupons and the appliance/e-waste programs operate year-round.
